[Jason Baehr](#) – an American professor of philosophy at Loyola Marymount University who is considered one of the world’s leading experts on educating for intellectual virtues; author of countless articles and books and co-founded two schools in California based on the cultivation of virtues like curiosity, open-mindedness, humility, and courage
2. [Rumman Chowdhury](#) – a Bangladeshi-American data scientist who founded [Humane Intelligence](#) to push for enforcement of ethics policies, laws, and regulations on tech companies
3. [Seeta Pena Gangadharan](#) – an American research justice organizer and professor at the London School of Economics who has done extensive

- research into internet privacy and has found that AI systems can exacerbate social injustice and inequality when set up without governance and frameworks to mitigate bad effects
